

These facilities are part of our new urgent and emergency care renovations, which aim to deliver better patient and staff experiences.

Our new resuscitation area, or resus, is fitted with modern technology and an ergonomic layout to provide optimal care for patients. It also has essential amenities such as a patient toilet, sluice, and storage room, which were added based on staff feedback.

Another great feature of the project, is the sleek new staff area on the second floor, which will transform the working environment for our team.

With a dedicated entrance and spacious layout, this revamped location offers a glossy retreat for staff to change, connect and recharge during breaks. It also has lockers to keep personal belongings safe, enhancing convenience and security.

UNLOCKING THE FUTURE

Automated drug cabinets set to transform care



As part of the renovation and expansion of ED, we are delighted to announce the introduction of automated drug cabinets, which will revolutionise the way we store, dispense, and order drugs for patients.

Automated drug cabinets are secure, computerised systems that allow specially trained staff to access and administer drugs with a simple scan of their fingerprints. No more fumbling for keys, wasting time, or risking errors.

The cabinets will automatically track and record every transaction, ensuring traceability and accountability. They will also communicate with the pharmacy, sending alerts and orders when stocks are low or expired, ensuring the department always have the drugs needed.

The benefits of automated drug cabinets are numerous: They will save time, improve workflow and enhance safety, said Joanna Jarvis, Clinical Change Lead for UECUP. "It will really improve access controls and safety – removing the reliance on physical sets of keys."
